## **Preface**

This volume contains a collection of 18 papers presented at the 4th International Workshop on Complex Systems. This workshop was sponsored by Institute of Fluid Science, Tohoku University, Japan. It was held at Sendai City, Japan, from 10 to 12 January 2007. A total of 22 participants, including 8 participants from 3 foreign countries, such as Germany, Korea, and the United State, attended the meeting, exchanging their scientific experiences. The main topics of this meeting were as follows:

- **II. Glass Transitions**
- III. Structure and Patterns
- IV. Cross Disciplinary Physics
